Throughout my adult life I have worked with youth from a variety of backgrounds and life experiences. I believe it is important we try to help others, particularly in a time of life when they are most vulnerable.

In college, I was a Big Brother for a young teen who had no father and needed another guy to hang around with to talk to, do things with, and provide hands on mentoring. As a law student, one of my jobs was working with a Puget Sound legal aid organization that worked with the area juvenile detention facility. We would provide legal support to juveniles in the care of the county – I found this both meaningful and interesting.

As a Navy judge advocate, I dealt literally with 100's of teenager sailors who were in trouble and needed help. Often, I would be asked to build a team – often the medical officer, chaplain and myself – to help the young sailor and recommendations to the Commanding Officer how to help the individual and possibly salvage his career.

After retiring from the Navy, I decided to do a career shift. I went back to school, got a master's in education and starting teaching middle school and high school. At Herndon HS, I taught several classes of students with special needs. I thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity and ended up being selected as "New Teacher of the Year" out of 21 teachers.

When we moved to Colorado 2 ½ years ago, I started teaching for a middle school and high school with a diverse population. Again, it was a tremendous experience. Although offered a contract for the next teaching year, some family needs required I return to Virginia for almost 8 months. Now that I have returned, I want to get active in the community, including volunteering to help where I can. I believe I can bring helpful life experiences and insights to the Juvenile Community Review Board and would be honored to serve.
